- Totus mundus agit histrionem* - the whole world is a playhouse. Re-worded by Shakespeare in *As you like it* to 'All the world's a stage'.
- A Quarto text was a 'stolen' version of a play. These versions were obtained by someone attending a play and copying the lines the actors spoke. The play would then be performed in another theatre. Copyright did not exist in Elizabethan times.
- To take advantage of daylight as there was no artificial lighting.
